# WHO Hands Over 940 tablets to the Ministry of Health



**Nairobi, Kenya** - WHO reaffirmed its commitment to advancing Kenya's healthcare digitalization agenda by donating 940 mobile tablets to the Ministry of Health. This significant contribution, valued at \$376,132, was warmly received during a handover ceremony attended by key health officials.

He emphasized the importance of reaching the unreached populations, particularly in urban poor areas, displaced communities, and among migrants, for vital vaccinations such as HPV for adolescent girls and measles-rubella.

The donation of 940 tablets marks a significant milestone in the Ministry of Health's efforts to strengthen healthcare infrastructure and improve emergency response capabilities. These tablets, equipped with features for remote tracking and management, are poised to enhance data quality for decision-making processes within Kenya's healthcare system.

Health CS Nakhumicha expressed her appreciation to WHO for the donation, recognizing the tablets' role in enhancing data quality for decision-making at the Vaccines Programme. PS Muthoni reiterated the tablets' potential to bolster the Ministry's digital agenda, while PS H. Kimtai welcomed the donation as a vital step towards improving healthcare delivery in Kenya.

# Investing in Early Childhood: Building Human Capital Along the Life Course



Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, March, 2024 - WHO Kenya co-organised and participated in the 2024 Eastern Africa Regional Early Childhood Conference on Early Childhood Development. The conference served as a platform for stakeholders to take stock of the status of early childhood development in the region, share knowledge, and explore innovative models of quality early childhood interventions.

Under the theme "Investing in Early Childhood: Building Human Capital along the Life Course," the conference brought together policymakers, civil society organizations, grassroots advocacy groups, academia, development partners, and other multisectoral stakeholders interested in improving early childhood outcomes. The event provided an opportunity to showcase innovative programs, foster dialogue, and build consensus around key advocacy issues.

Inspired by the goal of achieving an Africa fit for children by the year 2040 and the African Union's theme of the year "Educate and Skill Africa for the 21st Century", and motivated to contribute to the realization of Agenda 2063 on the Africa We Want, stakeholders expressed concern that the investment in early childhood development is still below the recommended standards. Support to programs in education, health, specialized services, and nutrition remains insufficient in the region.

During the conference, WHO Kenya participated in sessions promoting knowledge exchange and emphasized prioritizing early childhood development in national and regional agendas. They stressed the need for adequate resource allocation and collaboration among stakeholders to scale up development services.

The conference culminated in a series of resolutions and a final communique, emphasizing the critical role of early childhood development as a cornerstone for socioeconomic transformation and sustainable development in the Eastern Africa Region. Participants committed to strengthening their collective efforts to advance early childhood development as a key driver of positive change.

World Malaria Day was commemorated at the Pawtenge Primary School Grounds in Muhoroni, Kisumu, Kenya, on April 24th, with the participation of guests, including Hon Susan Nakhumicha, Cabinet Secretary for Health, and Ms. Muthoni Kariuki, Principal Secretary for Public Health and Professional Standards. Despite concerted efforts, Kenya continued to face a significant malaria burden, reporting up to 3.2 million malaria cases and 11,000 related deaths annually.

This year's World Malaria Day theme, "Gender Health Equity and Human Rights," underscored Kenya's commitment to advancing health equity, gender equality, and human rights principles in its malaria control efforts.

The commemoration emphasized collective action towards a malaria-free Kenya, advocating for the rights and equality of all citizens. Kenya's dedication, alongside the support of partners, reaffirmed the nation's resolve to achieve a malaria-free future. With sustained investment in malaria control and resilient health systems, Kenya aimed to make significant strides towards this ambitious goal.





# **Global Leaders Advocate for One Health Approach** at UNEA6

Dr. Tedros Ghebreyesus of the WHO underscored the necessity of sustained political will and resource mobilization to effectively embed One Health principles into national and international policies.

# Regional Workshop **Boosts Baby-Friendly Health Care**





The workshop facilitated a dynamic exchange of ideas and best practices, underscoring the commitment of WHO and its partners to strengthen health systems and support maternal and child health in the region.



# 1.2 Million Children **Vaccinated Against Polio in 3 Counties**

WHO in collaboration with UNICEF and other partners supported the Ministry of Health Kenya, along with county governments to execute a polio vaccination campaign that immunized 1.2 million children across Wajir, Garissa, and Mandera counties.

The initiative aimed to address the reemergence of polio, particularly following new cases in the Dadaab refugee camps. The vaccination effort focused on children under the age of five in Wajir and Mandera, while extending to those up to 15 years old in Garissa. This campaign is part of ongoing efforts to enhance immunization coverage and maintain public health safeguards in the region, reflecting a strong commitment to controlling and eventually eradicating polio.





# Launch of the **African Snakebite** Alliance in Kenya

WHO, in collaboration with snakebite experts from across Africa, supported the international launch of the African Snakebite Alliance in Kenya. The event took place at the Kenya Institute of Primate Research (KIPRE) and was officiated by PS Health Mary Muthoni from Kenya's Ministry of Health.

It was attended by leading snakebite experts from 14 African countries and aims to tackle the neglected public health issue of snakebites, with a strategic goal to reduce snakebite deaths and disabilities by half before 2030. This initiative will focus on uniting experts and policymakers to improve access to life-saving treatments and enhance protection for vulnerable communities.



# 5M Ksh in Medicines and Gear Given During Kajiado Visit

This collaborative effort underscored the governments commitment to strengthening TB control efforts and improving public health outcomes in Kenya.

The strategic plan incorporates a community-centered approach aligned with WHO's 2022 guidelines, emphasizing evidence-based interventions and community engagement for grassroots TB detection. Through the deployment of Community Health Promoters, the plan aims to enhance TB detection at the grassroots level, addressing the root causes of TB barriers and accelerating progress towards the global goal of ending TB by 2030.





# World TB Day Celebrations





WHO joined national celebrations for World TB Day in Kenya, underscoring the importance of addressing factors driving the TB epidemic. The event, held in Murang'a County, highlighted the government's commitment to TB eradication and emphasized community involvement in disease prevention. CS Health Nakhumicha Wafula and Murang'a Governor Kang'ata emphasized key strategies, including community engagement and digitalization, in public health efforts.

The theme "Yes we can end TB" reflects a collective commitment to accelerating TB control efforts and achieving global targets. Efforts focus on strengthening health systems, expanding access to quality TB services, and integrating TB efforts into primary healthcare to ensure equitable access.



# Launch of Al App to identify skin conditions in Kenya.

WHO, in collaboration with partners, launched a pilot study in Kenya to test a mobile app using artificial intelligence to identify skin-related neglected tropical diseases (NTDs). This tool holds the potential to revolutionize the diagnostic process by enhancing health workers' capabilities to effectively detect and manage skin conditions.

During a detailed workshop, experts including Dr. Joyce Onsongo, WHO-Kenya lead for NTDs, along with county health workers, discussed the app's potential to boost prevention and treatment strategies, showcasing the promising integration of technology and public health in fighting NTDs.

# **Launch of NTD Supply Chain** Initiative

JSI has been chosen by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, in partnership with WHO, USAID, and pharmaceutical companies, to implement the Supply Chain Technical Support Mechanism (SCTSM) for Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs). This initiative aims to address supply chain challenges and improve access to NTD medicines.

Over the next five years, JSI will work closely with WHO over the next five years, JSI Will Work closely With WHO and other partners to strengthen supply chains in eight African countries, including Kenya, enhancing data collection, inventory management, and integration of NTD medicines into national health systems. This project supports the global effort to prevent, control, or eliminate NTDs by 2030, addressing a significant health challenge affecting over one billion people worldwide, with a particularly high burden in Africa.



# **Enhancing Nursing & Midwifery in Kenya**

In response to global health directives, Kenya has taken significant strides to fortify its nursing and midwifery sector. Following the adoption of the Global Strategic Directions for Nursing and Midwifery 2021-2025 (GSDNM) by the Seventy-fourth World Health Assembly, Kenya crafted its National Nursing and Midwifery Policy for the period 2022–2032. This policy outlines a comprehensive framework to guide the profession's development, practice, and service delivery in Kenya.

To ensure effective implementation of the policy at the grassroots level, a coordination meeting convened Chief Nursing Officers, nurse leaders from various sectors, regulatory bodies such as the Nursing Council of Kenya, professional associations, and the Nurses Union. Together, they reviewed the policy's implementation status and collaboratively devised a strategic plan for nursing and midwifery. This concerted effort aims to address healthcare challenges and improve service delivery across Kenya's diverse counties, aligning with global directives for enhanced healthcare outcomes. The meeting provided a platform for experience sharing and learning across counties, for experience sharing and learning across counties, fostering discussions and consensus on strategic priorities for Nursing and Midwifery in the country.





# **Partnerships to Strengthen Health** workforce in Kenya

WHO signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Government of the United Kingdom's Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) to strengthen the health workforce in Kenya. Through the Global Health Workforce Program (GHWP), WHO is supporting the Ministry of Health to optimize the health workforce in Kenya through improved data availability and utilization, enhancing workforce performance and quality, and developing evidence-informed policies and strategic plans.

Similarly, the Tropical Health Education Trust (THET) will manage partnerships for health workforce development in Kenya, Ghana, and Nigeria, aiming to build stronger health systems and progress towards UHC. THET will closely liaise with WHO country offices to contribute to Human Resources for Health planning and management, supported by DHSC funding under GHWP in Kenya.
