Vision Statement:

My vision is a healthier, resilient, and prosperous Africa where everyone has access to quality healthcare, supported by equitable, innovative, and sustainable systems that ensure optimal well-being.

Priorities:

- 1. Universal Health Coverage (UHC): Improve access to essential health services and address financial barriers preventing care.
- 2. **Maternal and Child Health:** Focus on reducing maternal and infant mortality by improving access to quality services. Africa accounts for over 70% of global maternal deaths and more than half of under-five deaths and mainstreaming gender in all settings.
- 3. Combating Communicable and Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs): Strengthen responses to communicable diseases (e.g., malaria, TB, HIV/AIDS) and NCDs, which account for 37% of deaths in Africa. By early detection, management, and immunization.
- 4. **Primary Health Care (PHC):** Strengthen PHC as the foundation of UHC by improving governance, infrastructure, and workforce development for accessible care. PHC is essential for equitable, sustainable healthcare. The Ouagadougou (2008), Alma-Ata (1978), and Astana (2018) Declarations provide frameworks for resilient, people-centered health systems in Africa.
- 5. **Climate-Resilient Health Systems:** Health risks from climate change by integrating adaptation into health systems and promoting cross-sector collaboration to mitigate these risks.
- 6. **Health Security:** Pandemic preparedness to better equip Africa for future health emergencies. I support the ongoing pandemic agreement discussions through the INB and commend the Regional Director for leading Africa in amending the 2005 IHR and drafting the Pandemic Treaty with solidarity. I will encourage African Member States to finalize these efforts.
- 7. **Innovation and Research:** Local research and innovations to address Africa's health challenges with sustainable, context-driven solutions.
- 8. **Partnerships and Collaboration:** Strengthen alliances with regional and global partners to leverage resources and expertise for Africa's health goals. This includes partnering with the African Union, Africa CDC, Regional Economic Communities, national governments, UN agencies (Multilateral and Bilateral) and building cross-border initiatives to address shared challenges like pandemics and supply chain disruptions.

- 9. **Antimicrobial Resistance:** I will support GLASS and ensure ongoing reporting of resistance and consumption data to address growing concerns in Africa.
- 10. **Domestic Health Financing:** Advocate for innovative financing, including public-private partnerships, blended financing, climate funds, and Universal Health Insurance to close the funding gap.
